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

What Is the Farm Bill?




- An omnibus bill governing policy in many areas of the agriculture sector, including farm income support, food assistance, trade, and more
- Negotiated & reauthorized by Congress every five years since 1933
- 530 pages
- \$956 billion
- Bipartisan

Food Insecurity Rates by County (2021)




- **SNAP:** Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program
 - GusNIP: Gus Schumacher Nutrition Incentive Program
 - **SNAP E&T:** Employment and Training
 - **SNAP-Ed:** Nutrition Education
 - SNAP-O: Outreach
- **TEFAP:** The Emergency Food Assistance Program (emergency food boxes)
- **CSFP:** Commodity Supplemental Food Program (senior food boxes)
- FDPIR: Food Distribution Program on Indian Reservations
- SFMNP: Senior Farmers' Market Nutrition Program



Note: Programs focused on child nutrition—school meals, summer meals, WIC (Women, Infants & Children), WIC FMNP (Farmers' Market Nutrition Program), CACFP (Child & Adult Care Food Program), etc.—are authorized through separate legislation.

SNAP is America's largest and most effective anti-hunger program.

Eligible families use an electronic benefit transfer (EBT) card to purchase food at more than **4,200 retailers and grocers** across Arizona.



AzFBN 2023 Farm Bill Priorities

- Strengthen SNAP: Improve adequacy, accessibility & equity
 - Increase the monthly benefit
 - Repeal the Three-Month Time Limit
 - Repeal the Five-Year Bar
 - Repeal the Drug Felony Ban
 - Allow purchase of hot/prepared foods
 - Allow dual enrollment with FDPIR
 - Make college student access equal
 - Remove BAH from SNAP eligibility calculations for military service members
- Improve & Fully Fund TEFAP
 - \$900M for food and \$100M for S&D (~2% to AZ)
 - Make pandemic flexibilities permanent
- Increase Access & Enhance CSFP
 - Streamline income eligibility with TEFAP

Marker Bils What is policy



What is a marker bill? A bill introduced in Congress to signal policy ideas and gather support for those ideas, most often with a goal of inclusion in an omnibus bill like the farm bill.

Why do we need them? Marker bills help lawmakers and grassroots advocates alike build support for policy asks.

With a large omnibus bill like the farm bill, having smaller packages like marker bills helps ideas get attention - and the more support we get for the marker bills we like, the more likely they'll be pulled into the final omnibus bill.

Strengthening Local Processing Act S.354 and H.R.945



Senator John Thune (R-SD), Senator Sherrod Brown (D-OH), Representative Chellie Pingree (D-ME), and Representative Jim Baird (R-IN)

> SLPA is a comprehensive bill that promotes competitive agricultural markets and invests in economic development by addressing acute livestock supply chain issues, supporting small meat and poultry processing plants, and promoting training programs that will bolster the resilience of communities and their food systems.

\$20 million in competitive grants to small and very small establishments, state inspected facilities, custom exempt facilities, or new small-scale slaughter facilities for activities related to promoting appropriate upscaling to meet local needs, and to business practices that make these plants more resilient.



Agriculture Resilience Act H.R.1840 and S.1016

Congresswoman Chellie Pingree (D-ME) and Senator Martin Heinric (D-NM)

A comprehensive approach to addressing climate change in agriculture that offers straightforward, farmer-driven, incentive-based strategies for how the next farm bill can address climate change while supporting farmer livelihoods.

Agricultural research, soil health, farmland preservation, pasture-based livestock management, on-farm renewable energy, and food waste initiative.



Farmers' Market & Food Bank Local Revitalization Act

Representatives Kaptur (D-OH) & Evans (D-PA)

Investments in local and regional food systems which will strengthen the connections between local farmers and local eaters, all while supporting public health and a vibrant economy.

Funding for SFMNP and WICFMNP, increasing individual benefit levels. Infrastructure for farmers' markets. Pilot Program for food banks and local farmer contracting.



Movement Building

ORGANIZING is the process of building organizations of people to use their collective power to win changes in peoples' lives and shift the balance of power. A MOVEMENT is a large-scale sustained mobilizations of masses of individuals and organizations united in common action by a common issue or vision. **Movements are bigger than any single** organizations' efforts although organizations are key to developing sustainable and effective movements. For the most part, movements are united around a common issue or vision, but they are larger than any one ideology or belief system. In general, social movements draw on a wide range of tactics and methods.







Roles of Organizer

- Build the Base
 - Develop relationships with those who are impacted by an issue and want to create solutions.
- Leadership Development
 - Capacity building of members that give them the skills, knowledge, and confidence to solve the issue.
- Campaigns
 - Achieve changes through advocacy or policy change.
 - Coordinate our fight through various tactics.
- Create Coalitions
 - Focus on an issue together
 - Exercise our collective power
